FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK:

This past May, I celebrated one year in the Executive Director role at Friedens Community Ministries. As I reflect over the past year, I'm reminded of the things that drew me to Friedens as a volunteer 6 years ago and the things I learned, and continue to learn, through my Friedens family.

1. WE GOT THIS!

In the face of adversity – a leak in the ceiling, a flat tire on our food recovery truck, a giant delivery of frozen blueberries, physical distancing guidance – the first reaction is never panic, but an audible 'We Got This!'. As a team we face the challenges and the unknown with curiosity, positivity, and resilience.

2. WE ALL HAVE SOMETHING TO GIVE AND RECEIVE.

At Friedens we build on what we have, and what we have we share. This culture of abundance permeates all that we do. Though some may experience limited financial resources, they bring kindness and willing hands. Others may have enough food to eat at home, but walk away transformed by their experience. All are received as members of the same family - whose support cultivates strong community food centers across Milwaukee.

3. IT'S MORE THAN FOOD.

At our pantries there is often little distinction between those who come for food, those who come for friendship, and those who come to offer service – nourishment comes in many forms and all are nourished here. Thank you for nourishing my spirit as I work alongside you to help nourish our neighbors. I'm honored to continue to support this network in my role as Executive Director.

Now, more than ever, we must transform the ways in which we nourish community, and I am committed to challenging the deep roots of food inequities with your help. I look forward to developing innovative and socially just strategies to continue our mission with each of you.

A Community Food Center for All!

Friedens transcends the limits of traditional pantries creating environments that build and connect community. We are committed to providing holistic nourishment for healthy lives by supplying individuals and families in need, not only with healthy emergency food, but we strive to provide a safe welcoming space, creating social connections and a sense of belonging that provide nourishment to the soul as well.

Friedens' Despensa de la Paz Food Pantry operations for some time have required a larger, more functional space to meet the community's needs. For a decade, this pantry has operated once a week, serving 150-200 households every Saturday in only a small kitchenette, meeting room, and corridor. Yet, with the high food insecurity rates experienced within the Muskego Way neighborhood, we see an ever-increasing need for our services. In response we began a capital expansion project to transform our Despensa de la Paz operations into a community food center, expanding our physical space to support a variety of wrap-around services beyond food provision, such as wellbeing education, healthy cooking, and community nights.

We actively engaged over 200 of our Despensa neighbors in a surveying effort that informed the planning for our next phase of growth. Our plan to transition into a community food center includes space for a full-service kitchen and large community space, which will be utilized for hands-on food preparation, nutrition education, and food waste learning, supported by community partners. Our future plans for a vibrant community garden space will root neighbors in the food system, providing an excellent opportunity to support environmental and sustainability education. We envision Despensa as being a health hub - a place for neighbors to access not only food but additional health supporting programming and resources.

The community food center model is built around a mission of dignified community building through partnerships, programs, and advocacy with the goal of increasing access to healthy food, food resource management, and healthy cooking skill-building while fostering community connections and a sense of belonging. Implementing this model mobilizes community members to create positive social change that helps the community to thrive. We invite all our stakeholders into this process - valuing the time, talent, and treasure of all who have helped us get so far.

COVID Update: Our pantries remain open!

In response to the current health crisis, we've made adjustments to our operations to keep everyone safe:

- All food and supply distribution is **curbside**
- Volunteers and staff have been provided with **PPE** and disinfect surfaces frequently
- We've opened a **diaper bank** distribution site and provide infant formula at all sites
- With the support of the Medical College of Wisconsin, United Way, and UnitedHealthcare Friedens is including **masks** and **hand sanitizer** in our distribution communities.
- Food demonstrations and preparation will be moved to **virtual** format in the fall.
